One year has almost passed since we revived the Nanaimo naturalist club as *Nature Nanaimo*, and we can look back on a very successful first year of activities. We have seen well-attended meetings on a wide variety of topics, ranging from owls, bats and spiders to mushrooms and spring flowers. We have enjoyed excursions on a similarly wide range of topics, e.g., birds, animal rescue, intertidal marine animals and fossils. We plan to work towards starting several projects, including building and helping with the setup, replacement and monitoring of Purple Martin nest boxes to aid in the recovery efforts led by the Georgia Basin Ecological Assessment and Restoration Society (<u>http://www.georgiabasin.ca/puma.htm</u>), and possibly a stream restoration project.
