### **Turkey Vulture / Hawk Migration**

While we are not planning a specific Nature Nanaimo outing for the event - this is a head's up that the following couple of weeks are the peak migration time for turkey vultures and many hawks and this affords some great viewing opportunities at the south end of Vancouver Island - particularly at "Beechey Head" in the East Sooke Regional Park - accessible from the East Sooke Regional Park - Aylard Farm Parking Lot. At this location, the birds "kettle" - soring in large numbers while gaining high altitude before making their way across the Strait of Juan de Fuca on their journey south. It is not uncommon to see many dozens of birds circling at once (see links below).

So for those of you looking for a birding adventure you might want to consider watching the weather and planning on a drive down to the park on a nice (ideally sunny) day during the last week of Sept or the first week of October.

The best viewing is from the rocky "Beechey Head" in the park - this requires hiking in and out along a trail (or via a loop) - about 6 km, which is of moderate difficulty so be sure you are prepared for a bit of a workout and some rougher sections. But if you like - you can also simply watch for birds from the large open areas near the main parking lot. Binoculars are a must, while a spotting scope is a welcome addition.

# Global Big Day - October 9



Mark your calendars for October Big Day—9 October 2021! Big Days are a 24-hour opportunity

to celebrate birds near and far.

Wherever you are on 9 October, take a few minutes to join the world of birding on October Big Day. By taking part in October Big Day you're also joining the second-ever <u>Global Bird Weekend</u> and celebrating <u>World Migratory Bird Day</u>. Be a part of the global team, and help set a new record for birding.

We recognize that COVID-19 continues to impact our communities. Even if your local conditions have improved, we always encourage everyone to put safety first, follow local guidelines, and <u>bird mindfully</u>. You can bird from home and still participate in October Big Day!

#### How to participate

- Get an eBird account: eBird is a worldwide bird checklist program used by millions of birders. It's what allows us to compile everyone's sightings into a single massive October Big Day list—while at the same time collecting the data for scientists to use to better understand birds. Sign up here. It's 100% free.
- Watch birds on 9 October. It's that simple! October Big Day runs from midnight to midnight in your local time zone. You don't need to be a bird expert, or go out all day long. You can report birds from anywhere in the world—even 10 minutes in your backyard will help.
- Enter what you see and hear on eBird: You can enter your sightings <u>via our website</u> or—
  even easier—download the <u>free eBird Mobile app</u>. The app allows you to keep and
  submit lists while you're still out birding, explore nearby Hotspots, and will even track of
  how far you've walked so you can focus on watching birds. Please submit your eBird
  checklists before 13 October to be included in our initial results announcement.
- Watch the sightings roll in: During the day, keep an eye on how the lists are growing in different parts of the world. Follow along with reports from more than 160 countries. Stats will be updated in real-time on our October Big Day page

## **Guided Bird Walks in Nanaimo and Parksville – Tuesdays & Sundays**



The Backyard Wild Bird and Nature Store in Nanaimo – Guided Bird Walks:

We have been hosting weekly bird walks for over 20-years in the Nanaimo area of Vancouver Island. Our walks are scheduled for Sundays (Nanaimo) and Tuesdays (Parksville/ Qualicum), and we post all scheduling information on <u>our blog</u>.

The Sunday Bird Walk leaves the Birdstore at 9 a.m. on Sunday Mornings. The Parksville/Qualicum Beach Tuesday Bird Walk leaves the Parksville Beach Community Park (at the end of Corfield) at 9 a.m. on Tuesday mornings. We meet near the parking area at the Lion's Playground. The Tuesday Bird Walk is not held during the summer months (July & August) but it resumes the first Tuesday in September. There is no charge for our bird walks, and they are designed to conclude before lunch (average approximately 2 hours). Want more information? Please note: We decide on the location of each bird walk the week before the scheduled bird walk outing. During the week we compile information about what birds are being seen and examine the weather forecast to ensure the walk is scheduled for the most productive location.

#### Mushrooms of British Columbia: A New Royal BC Museum Handbook

In September 2021, the Royal BC Museum (RBCM) released Mushrooms of British Columbia, a new volume in its popular Handbook series (see press release this issue, p. 5). This is the third RBCM mushroom guide, after George Hardy's 1952 Some Mushrooms and Other Fungi of British Columbia and Robert Bandoni and Adam Szczawinski's 1964 (revised 1976) Guide to Common Mushrooms of British Columbia. In its 480 pages, the new RBCM Handbook describes and illustrates more than 350 species and mentions another 850 species. More than two dozen essays on a wide variety of BC mushroom-related topics are scattered throughout the book. This rollicking talk by the book's co-authors, which focuses on the "fun" in "fungi," reviews the reasons for producing a new BC mushroom guide, the process involved in producing it, and some of the recent developments in mycology that complicate the production of mushroom guides.
